for the financial year ended 31 March 2022

The directors present their Directors' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report and Trustees' Report, and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 March 2022.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), effective 1 January 2019.

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are known as members of the Board of Trustees.

In this report the directors of International Dance Festival of Ireland CLG present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year ended 31 March 2022.

The company is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102, the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

International Dance Festival of Ireland CLG, trading as Dublin Dance Festival, is a company registered in Ireland which was incorporated on 1 June 2000. Dublin Dance Festival is a company limited by guarantee not having a share capital. Dublin Dance Festival is also a charity with CHY number 14495 and is registered with the Charities Regulatory Authority (RCN 20047436).

Mission Statement

At Dublin Dance Festival, we believe in the power of dance to move, connect and inspire change. We believe dance has a unique power to explore and express what it is to be human, right now.

Dublin Dance Festival creates opportunities year-round for audiences and artists exploring new models for making and engaging with dance. Each year in May, we present the best international and Irish dance performances in venues and spaces throughout Dublin city.

We generate opportunities for artists through residencies, commissions and partnerships, and by encouraging artistic collaboration and innovation in dance. Dublin Dance Festival is a vital platform for artists and the creation of new work.

Dublin Dance Festival champions the potential of the moving body to unlock new perspectives on our changing world.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governance

At the annual general meeting of the company each year, the Directors who have completed their term of office shall retire. Directors are invited to serve for a set term of office of three years. A retiring Director shall be eligible for election for a further term of office which, when aggregated with the term already served, shall not exceed six years. A year for this purpose shall mean the period from one annual general meeting of the company to the next.

The Directors may determine the period for which the Chairperson or a Director is to hold office and unless otherwise determined, the term shall be a maximum of six years.

The secretary shall be appointed by the Board for such term and upon such conditions as it may think fit; and the secretary so appointed may be removed by the Board.

Company Secretary

Tiina Ylönen is the company secretary.

Members

Members of the charitable company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding €1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of a winding up.

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

Dublin Dance Festival presented an online Summer Edition in May 2021 when it was not possible to present a live, in-person Festival due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. This was followed by a live platform in November 2021 when it was possible to host in-person audiences again.

Summer Edition

The Summer Edition presented two weeks of fresh, daring and courageous dance online including dance performances, documentaries, participative workshops via Zoom, behind-the-scenes content and interviews and discussions with dance artists.

Dublin Dance Festival was delighted to commission six new, international digital works created in six different countries for presentation online. Two new pioneering works from Irish artists were also created and filmed for broadcast. Captured on the stage of the Abbey Theatre, Liz Roche Company created a series of films entitled, Demos - films of separation and togetherness. Dance artist, Justine Doswell staged a beautiful new duet, dyad, in Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin.

A mixed bill of four new works performed by Ballet national de Marseille was presented online. The choreographers of these works were Oona Doherty (Dublin Dance Festival Associate Artist 2020-2022), Lucinda Childs, Tânia Carvalho and Lasseindra Ninja. Lyon Opera Ballet presented a programme of three recent works and Crystal Pite and Jonathon Young, the creators of the Olivier Award-winning *Betroffenheit* (presented by Dublin Dance Festival in 2016), shared the filmed version of their latest critically acclaimed dance-theatre piece, Revisor.

The Summer Edition included films and documentaries that offered insight into the creative process. The stunning documentary *Dancing at Dusk*, captured the last rehearsal of Pina Bausch's *The Rite of Spring*. This was performed by a specially assembled cast of 38 dancers from 14 African countries on a beach in Senegal just days before the country went into lockdown due to Covid-19. An intimate documentary on the revolutionary contemporary flamenco star Rocío Molina gave audiences insight into the renowned artist's creative process.

The final weekend of the Summer Edition was an invitation to 'keep moving' with family, friends and community. A film and workshop package for families and schools explored themes of nature and sustainability and was presented in partnership with The Ark Children's Cultural Centre. Partnering with arts charity That's Life, we developed a digital version of Bounce - a live dance and music club for adults with intellectual disabilities. Dublin Dance Festival presented a live streamed version of the event via Zoom, which was supported by the ESB Energy for Generations Fund and Northern Trust

Winter Edition

During the month of November, Dublin Dance Festival was thrilled to welcome audiences back into the theatre for the first time since 2019 with our Winter Edition - a unique and very special celebration of live dance. It featured premieres of three long-awaited new commissions from Irish artists together with a performance from an iconic international choreographer.

Award-winning dance innovators Junk Ensemble collaborated with acclaimed visual artist Alice Maher for the premiere of *The Misunderstanding of Myrrha*. Commissioned by DDF and presented in partnership with the Abbey Theatre, this captivating solo dance work combined intricate choreography and stunning visual design to reimagine an ancient Greek myth.

Renowned French choreographer Maguy Marin brought her iconic piece May B to Dublin as part of the Winter Edition. This powerfully theatrical work opened to sold out houses and garnered rave reviews.

The live performance of Demos by Liz Roche Company and Crash Ensemble co-commissioned by Dublin Dance Festival and the Abbey Theatre, wowed audiences with breath-taking music, innovative design and sublime choreography in a multi-disciplinary work.

The closing performance of the festival saw the premiere of Catherine Young's Floating on a Dead Sea in partnership with Backstage Theatre in Longford. Originally due to premiere at the Festival in 2020, this moving and visceral reflection on life amidst the Palestinian conflict offered a chance to listen more deeply to voices seldom heard.

5,177 audience members attended events in 2021 - very strong level of engagement in the context of severe restrictions and lockdowns at the height of the pandemic in Ireland. Due to the continued support of The Arts Council of Ireland and our other stakeholders, Dublin Dance Festival continued to resource the creation of new artistic works and to find new ways to connect with audiences and to experience dance throughout 2021.

Financial Review

The results for the financial year are set out on page 12 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the company has assets of €236,583 (2021 - €248,343) and liabilities of €72,643 (2021 - €165,401). The net assets of the company have increased by €80,998.

Financial Position

Dublin Dance Festival generated a surplus in this financial period. The company will invest the surplus in artistic commissions and activities and into company reserves which will help safeguard the company.

Reserves Position and Policy

Dublin Dance Festival has reserves to assist the company during any period of unforeseen difficulty. Funding of the required level of reserves is an integral part of the company's financial forecast and annual planning.

The Directors have adopted a reserves policy where the level of reserves will be maintained at a minimum of three months' operating costs and kept under review. The reserves will be allocated from unrestricted funds and generated from annual operational surplus.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The Directors are aware of the risks to which the company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the organisation where, due to wider cultural, societal and economic factors - (i) levels of public funding may fluctuate year on year; (ii) earned income (box office sales and sponsorship) may not reach projected targets; and (iii) income and expenditure is impacted by the global Covid-19 pandemic. Risk is managed by careful budgeting, monitoring and engagement with core funders and stakeholders.

In 2021, programmes were significantly impacted by the global Covid-19 pandemic. This affected the presentation of live performance and box office potential for the Festival with venues closed or working at very reduced capacity. The capacity of national and international artists to work and travel was also severely restricted. The company reviewed schedules, plans and forecasts regularly throughout 2021, working with contingencies across schedules and financial projections and making adjustments when required. The company will continue detailed scenario planning in 2022. The Directors are satisfied that the company has implemented adequate and appropriate measures to minimise and manage risk.

Plans for Future Periods

Dublin Dance Festival will continue to present international contemporary dance of the highest possible standard and to promote excellence in a national context. It will continue to develop key partnerships and networks which will help drive the Festival's objectives. Dublin Dance Festival has grown its capacity around the delivery of hybrid programming, including live and digital elements. We will continue to monitor and respond to the impact of the global Covid-19 pandemic in 2022 and will respond creatively in order to deliver artistic programmes and projects.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the company financial statements of International Dance Festival of Ireland CLG for the financial year ended 31 March 2022 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (incorporating an Income and Expenditure Account), the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

In our opinion the financial statements:

 of its surplus for the financial year then ended;

GENERAL INFORMATION

International Dance Festival of Ireland CLG is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office of the company is Festival House, 12 East Essex Street, Temple Bar, Dublin 2, D02 EH42 which is also the principal place of business of the company. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

The company has applied the Charities SORP on a voluntary basis as its application is not a requirement of the current regulations for charities registered in the Republic of Ireland. As permitted by the Companies Act 2014, the company has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 31 March 2022 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the company.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the company.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

Income

Income is recognised by inclusion in the Statement of Financial Activities only when the company is legally entitled to the income, performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, the amounts involved can be measured with sufficient reliability and it is probable that the income will be received by the company.

Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities include income earned from the supply of services under contractual arrangements and from performance related grants which have conditions that specify the provision of particular services to be provided by the company. Income from government and other co-funders is recognised when the company is legally entitled to the income because it is fulfilling the conditions contained in the related funding agreements. Where a grant is received in advance, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, it is accrued in debtors.

Grants from governments and other co-funders typically include one of the following types of conditions:

- Performance based conditions: whereby the company is contractually entitled to funding only to the extent
 that the core objectives of the grant agreement are achieved. Where the company is meeting the core
 objectives of a grant agreement, it recognises the related expenditure, to the extent that it is reimbursable by
 the donor, as income.
- •Time based conditions: whereby the company is contractually entitled to funding on the condition that it is utilised in a particular period. In these cases the company recognises the income to the extent it is utilised within the period specified in the agreement.

In the absence of such conditions, assuming that receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured, grant income is recognised once the company is notified of entitlement.

Grants received towards capital expenditure are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable, whichever is earlier.

Donated services or facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity, this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Expenditure

Expenditure is analysed between costs of charitable activities and raising funds. The costs of each activity are separately accumulated and disclosed, and analysed according to their major components. Expenditure is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, a transfer of economic benefits is required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be reliably measured. Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the company but cannot be attributed to one activity. Such costs are allocated to activities in proportion to staff time spent or other suitable measure for each activity.

Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs are analysed between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed, they are allocated in proportion to the benefits received. Salaries and associated costs which can be attributed to specific projects are charged accordingly.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

25% Straight line

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the company from government agencies and other co-funders, but not yet received at financial year end, is included in debtors.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

Taxation

No current or deferred taxation arises as the company has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

The CHY number of The Charity as confirmed by Revenue is 14495.

Financial Instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

3. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENT AND ESTIMATES

The preparation of these financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses.

Judgements and estimates are continually evaluated and are based on historical experiences and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

(a) Establishing useful economic lives for depreciation purposes of property, plant and equipment Long lived assets, consisting primarily of, fixtures, fittings and equipment, comprise a portion of total assets. The annual depreciation charge depends primarily on the estimated useful economic lives of each type of asset and estimates of residual value. The directors regularly review these asset useful economic lives and change them as necessary to reflect current thinking on remaining lives in light of prospective economic utilisation and physical condition of the assets concerned. Changes in asset useful lives can have a significant impact on depreciation and amortisation charges for the period. Detail of the useful economic lives is included in the accounting policies.
