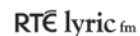

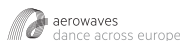

Prepare to dive into the next Dublin Dance Festival and a programme that captures the “right now” of international and Irish dance.

Dance artists are moving like brilliant magpies across tradition and into the unmapped modern; finding what choreographic sensibility can bring to performance, to the short story, to supposedly inanimate objects, and to dealing with the dance of death.

This year, our national theatre amplifies the importance of dance, dedicating two weeks to three major shows at the Abbey Theatre. The Festival opens with *Damaged Goods* treating Dublin audiences to the magnificent *Built to Last*. Following this, Liz Roche Company premieres a special commission, *Bastard Amber*. And then lightning strikes more than twice with flamenco virtuoso Israel Galván.

Working closely with the Goethe-Institut Dublin and colleagues overseas, we've selected a weird and wonderful strand of dance from Germany. Reconfigure gravity with *Renegade*, lead small children on an *Elephant Walk* with Célestine Hennermann, taste the end of the world with Eva Meyer-Keller and see Berlin's Sasha Waltz up close on film.

This is my last Dublin Dance Festival, as my four year tenure has come to an end. It's been a tough assignment squeezing all the dance I wanted to bring to Dublin into four Festivals, but it has been a fantastic, roller coaster adventure, now... hold on tight!

Bastard Amber is a major new work by leading Irish choreographer, Liz Roche. Moving her rigorous exploration of the body into the realm of the soul, this piece is inspired by W.B. Yeats' seminal poem *Sailing to Byzantium* and the meditative golden paintings of the late Patrick Scott.

Flamenco superstar, Israel Galván, brings his award-winning show *La Edad de Oro* (The Golden Age) to the Abbey Theatre stage. Both a rebel and a traditionalist, Galván is recognised as a master of contemporary flamenco. Famous for his power, precision and astonishingly complicated and rapid footwork, Galván dances flamenco on the cutting edge.

Bringing both great subtlety and explosive rhythmic movement to his work, Galván is faithful to the spirit of flamenco's long lineage and history, while smashing stereotypes and preconceptions common to the form. With live music by brothers David Lagos (vocalist) and Alfredo Lagos (guitar), in *La Edad de Oro* Galván strips flamenco to its bare essence, sculpting a form steeped in tradition, yet intoxicated by the moment.

Horse Racing is in the blood. Leading dancer Emma O'Kane has just discovered it.

Her grandfather, Phillip de Burgh O'Brien, was a bloodstock agent and a racing journalist from the 1940s–70s. He died before she was born but his words live on. From Phillip's writings to Emma's own experience of recently learning to ride a racehorse, *Jockey* explores the physical relationship between the dancer, the jockey and the Irish thoroughbred horse.

Featuring original racing footage and commentary, *Jockey* is the culmination of a year long collaboration between WillFredd Theatre, Emma O'Kane and the Irish Racing Community.

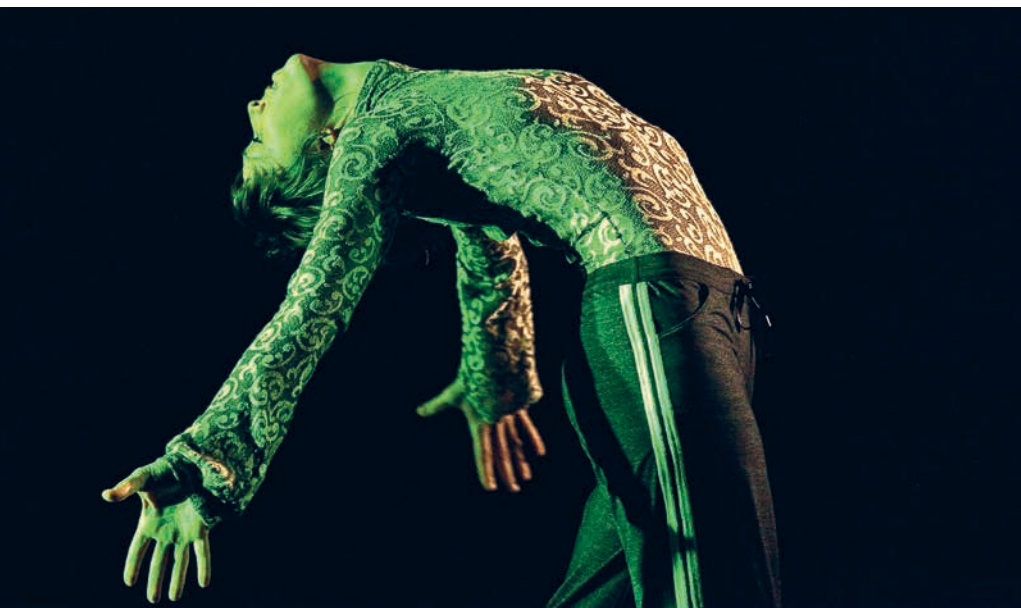

Curious, surprising and often funny, *Douglas* stems from actions imagined by Robbie Synge while working alone and performing various daily physical tasks at home.

A lone figure amongst a number of simple objects, Douglas is absorbed in activity. Through a series of physical experiments, he seeks connections between himself and the surrounding inanimate objects.
